Distinctions

- First “eco-planned” resort in the world still a model for other developments
- All buildings and signs are low and designed to blend in with their natural surroundings
- No building at The Sea Pines Resort is higher than the tallest oak or magnolia tree.
- The resort has the only oceanfront, open-air restaurant on Hilton Head Island.
- 1,300 acres (25 percent) of the resort will never be developed

Nature/Setting

- Beaches, tidal marshes and more than 50 lakes and lagoons
- Maritime Forests with palmettos, live oaks, magnolias and specimen pine trees, and decorated by distinctive Spanish Moss
- Audubon Society bird sanctuary with more than 350 species of birds including the Carolina Chickadee, Red-bellied Woodpecker and Great Horned Owl
- Other indigenous wildlife include deer, alligators, sea turtles, and dolphins

Eco-Exploration

- Sea Pines Forest Preserve: Features boardwalks that meander through the old Lawton Rice Field, Boggy Gut, Fish Island Trail and Vanishing Swamp leading to the 4,000 year-old Indian Shell Ring.
- Loggerhead Turtle Search: Explores nesting habitats and nest sites
- Beach Discovery: Guests learn how the delicate ecosystem is maintained through nature's complex makeup

Portrait

Harbour Town

Sailboats including the Stars and Stripes, million dollar luxury yachts and fishing boats punctuate the marina. Families climb to the top of the lighthouse, stroll in and out of waterfront boutiques and galleries, people-watch in one of the rocking chairs under the giant oak trees or watch the children play on the wooden Swiss Family Robinson-style playground.

South Beach

Reminiscent of a New England fishing village, the laid-back atmosphere is set against a backdrop of weatherworn buildings draped in colonial blues and reds accented with gas lantern lights. Taverns, daiquiri carts and kitschy souvenir shops surround the local legend - Salty Dog Café, which overlooks the marina where guests glimpse the shrimp boats docking for the evening.

Beach Club

Edged by five miles of sweeping Atlantic beaches and fringed by forests of live oaks and towering pines, this is the gathering point for sand and water activities. An open-air snack bar and restaurant with covered decks provide a reprieve from the South Carolina sun.

Golf

Harbour Town Golf Links

- Designed by Pete Dye (in consultation with Jack Nicklaus) in 1969
- Home of the PGA TOUR's The Heritage tournament since 1969
- Debuted on Golf Digest's ranking of America's 100 Greatest Golf Courses as one of the 10 best courses in the country
- Renovated by Pete Dye in 2004
- 6,973 yards
- Perennially ranked No. 1 in South Carolina and Top 20 in the United States by various ranking panels

Ocean Course

- First golf course on Hilton Head Island
- Designed by George Cobb in 1960
- Renovated by Mark McCumber in 1995
- Certified Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary
- Sweeping view of the Atlantic at the signature 15th hole
- 6,906-yards

Newly Designed Pete Dye Golf Course

- Rebuilt by Pete Dye in 2007
- Designed by George Cobb in 1967
- Renovated by Clyde Johnston in 1990
- Certified Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary
- 6,515-yards

The Sea Pines Resort is 45 miles from Savannah, Ga., and 95 miles south of Charleston, S.C. Motorists on I-95 take Exit 8 and follow Hwy. 278, 20 miles to the island.
